5 September, 2018 | Hong Kong - Hong Kong Art School and RMIT University are pleased to present the Master of Fine Art Graduate Exhibition 2018 -- *Peeling the Onion* in this September at Pao Galleries. The exhibition showcases 10 graduates' artworks including drawing, ceramics, photography, video, installation and more.





Why "Peeling the Onion"? Onions are bitter-sweet when raw and while they are a vital ingredient in the creation of many dishes, the act of preparing them can cause a few tears. This is an appropriate metaphor for our graduates' various experiences of the two-year MFA programme, referencing the emotional journeys and the artistic processes undertaken by the ten participating candidates. They have all had to peel back the layers of their own unique artistic practices - based in ceramics, photography, painting, performance and more - to try to uncover some essential understanding about their artworks. The humble and humorous title indicates something of their attitudes and approaches as visual artists.

IRVING YEE-MAN CHEUNG investigates how pain can be transformed, transferred, expressed, recreated and sublimated in the form of art.

PAT UNIQUE KWAN-TING CHONG utilizes tableaus of figurative ceramics that are based on her narrative creation of a mystery secret world.

BILLY KIN-WAH CHUNG scrutinizes inner feelings of psychological discomfort, alienation, empathy, love, comfort and regard through cat drawings on tissue paper and figurative paintings.

ZOE COUGHLAN explores the relationship between action and artefact and between maker and material, and is anchored in specific types of field archaeology.

TRACY CHUN-MAN LAM investigates a psyche of alienation and boredom inherent in contemporary everyday life.

JACK KIN-LAM LEE explores how when an individual looks at these physical quantities in a subjective and perceptual way, new meanings appear.

FLORENCE KA-MAN LI uses the body as an intermedium to create a physical dialogue with place and achieve a solitary moment.

BRIAN CHI-WAH LO investigates memory through focusing on three key components: time, intangible elements of memory and memory loss.

CATHERINE SUK-YEE SIU explores self-identity and beauty from the standpoint of a mature woman in Hong Kong negotiating a contemporary mix of Chinese and Western culture and values.


ADA CHEUK-YING WONG use projection to mediate experiences of the city between public and private, known and unknown, inside and outside, familiar and unfamiliar.
